Dear Mrs. McVey,

I refer to Baroness Buscombe's letter of 12th September 2017.

In the intervening period you may be aware that this council has expressed an interest to take part in the joint counter fraud initiative, following the invitation in the Minister's and Baroness Buscombe's letter of 10<sup>th</sup> October. This will sit well alongside our own existing counter fraud measures such as our investment last year in tackling tenancy fraud.

However, serious concerns remain with regard to the Department's penalties policy, which is at odds not only with this council's practice as regards such cases, when such matters were within our remit, but also the expectations of taxpayers both in our borough and I've no doubt around the country.

Administrative penalties will inevitably be regarded as a 'soft option', which sends a message of a lack of seriousness in pursuing the 'smaller' frauds. Indeed, I read with some dismay that the threshold under which such penalties are deemed appropriate was more than doubled last year to £5,000.

Just as the 'broken window theory' applies to crime on the streets, so the principle in fraud prosecution must be that even such relatively small cases are prosecuted to the fullest extent. Our residents may well ask how the department can justify applying a lower standard to a £5,000 theft from the taxpayer than Marks & Spencer would to the shoplifting of a pair of knickers.

On a positive note, we look forward to the joint working initiative and specialist local authority referrals team producing a higher number of prosecuted cases and, critically, that we do not see the delay in processing such cases that dogged the SFIS previously.
