5	OPERATIONAL UPDATES	Action
	The Deputy Borough Commander presented a DVD showing CCTV images and outlined the actions taken by the Council in partnership with the police following the public disorder experienced in Bromley on Monday 8 August, 2011, which had taken place after similar, more severe riots in other areas of London. Rioting and looting had taken place in Bromley, Beckenham and Orpington, and the impact of the disorder was felt to a lesser extent in wards such as Biggin Hill, Penge and Cator, Hayes and Coney Hall, Petts Wood and Knoll and Plaistow and Sundridge.  Within the Borough, a total of 85 offences had been attributed to the public disorder. This included 49 non-residential burglaries and 19 incidents of criminal damage, and 77 people had been arrested, of which 31 were Bromley residents. CCTV had proved an effective tool in both deploying police resources and in subsequent identification of suspects. The Deputy Borough Commander confirmed the investigation into offences committed during the public disorder would continue, with ten investigation hubs to be created across London.  In response to a question, the Borough Commander confirmed that a far reaching review of the Mark Duggan shooting was taking place. However the public disorder that had spread across London following this protest appeared to be largely of an opportunistic nature. Following the public disorder, work had been undertaken by partners to provide security, reassurance and advice to affected business owners, and Council cleansing teams had worked hard to restore town centre areas. James Cleverly underlined the importance of publicising the custodial sentences given to offenders to prevent further disorder.  Communications had been key to managing the response to the public disorder and had worked well with regular briefings held between the Police, the Council and other key partners and updates	

e-mailed out to key partners and community groups. Paula Morrison highlighted that health services had been able to remain open on the day following the disorder due to clear information from the Bromley Police. However due to misinformation many retail outlets had closed early across the Borough on the day following the disorder for fear of further disorder.

Judith Cross outlined findings from the recent Bromley Community Engagement Forum Outreach Day which indicated the vast majority of residents felt the Police kept residents aware of their activities, and suggested local radio was a good communication tool for the wider community. Susie Clark thanked members of the Partnership for supporting the communication of key messages and suggested the Communications Group hold a meeting to consider how communication processes might be built on in the future.

Andy Holcombe and Tracy Pigeon underlined the excellent work of the Police in protecting Fire and Ambulance crews during the public disorder. Call rates for ambulances had increased in the Borough however there had been no serious injuries. Andy Holcombe noted there had been up to 30 deliberate fires in the Borough on the night of the public disorder, and an increased incidence of deliberate fires had continued in Bromley in the weeks since the rioting.

The Chairman thanked all partners involved in the response to the public disorder for their contribution.

It was AGREED that the update be noted.

#### 6 REVIEW OF PARTNERSHIP INITIATIVES

Action

#### (a) Victim Support Youth Intervention Project – 3 Year Report

Cora Green gave an update on the Victim Support Youth Intervention Project that had been established in September 2008 to support young people who had been victims of crime or bullying. Initiatives included the Junior Citizens and Prison Me No Way days which took a multi-agency approach to raising young people's awareness of potential hazards and gave advice on issues including internet safety, bullying and personal safety. Other initiatives included YOT Victim Awareness Working Shops, which were delivered to young offenders aged 13-17 years, and Spiralling Workshops that promoted healthy relationships and domestic violence awareness to young people aged 15-21 years. Work had also been undertaken to encourage young people to report crime to Cora Green confirmed that three years additional funding had recently been secured by Victim Support Bromley as a result of the domestic violence aspect of the work delivered.

#### (b) Mentoring Initiative

The Assistant Director: Public Protection gave an update on the Mentoring Initiative. The scheme had been launched in summer

	2011 and although take-up had initially been low, it was expected that there would be a significant increase in referrals following the start of the school year.	
	(c) Protecting the Elderly and Vulnerable	
	The Head of Trading Standards gave an update on activities protecting the elderly and vulnerable. Work was currently being undertaken to strengthen links between partners and to identify potential funding streams. The Chairman confirmed that a report was due to be considered at the next meeting of Public Protection and Safety PDS Committee at 7.00pm on 25 <sup>th</sup> October 2011.

A special edition of the Safer Bromley News was currently being developed to communicate changes to Safer Neighbourhood Panels. There was potential to increase the contribution of partners to the Safer Bromley News by involving the members of the Communications Group.  It was AGREED that the update be noted.	SC

	Tactical Group Report – The Deputy Borough Commander reported that the Police were continuing to achieve a reduction in crime across the Borough, including violent crime offences, however there had been a slight increase in some offences. A Borough-wide initiative would be launched in October to target seasonal offences, including residential burglary and theft of motor vehicle offences as well as anti-social behaviour. Work was also continuing on the 'Enough is Enough' campaign, and recent arrests had been made in relation to drug offences.	
	DAT Report – Dave Prebble reported that tendering of services was currently on track and additional funding streams were being sought. A new service provider was now delivering the Harm Reduction service and was working to increase capacity by recruiting more GPs. The Youth Offending Team had received additional funding for its Triage Service, which had supported 77	

	young people from becoming involved in the criminal justice system between April-July 2011.  Arson Sub Group Report — Andy Holcombe reported that training was being undertaken with the Community Safety Team. There had been an increase in incidence of deliberate fires since the public disorder in the Borough and work was being undertaken to target a spate of deliberate fires in Crystal Palace Park.  Bromley Community Engagement Forum Report — Judith Cross confirmed that a Youth Conference for children and young people with disabilities would be held in the Great Hall, Bromley Civic Centre on 6 <sup>th</sup> October 2011. A meeting of Multi Faiths had been arranged for 2 <sup>nd</sup> November 2011, and a project involving youth and the older generation was currently being developed.

#### 1 SUMMARY

1.1 This report provides an update in relation to the targets for the Safer Bromley Partnership agreed in July 2011. The report provides the latest performance monitoring data to 30 September 2011 (Quarter 2)

#### 2 RECOMMENDATION

- 2.1 The Strategic Group is asked to
  - Note the performance information contained within the report.

#### 3 BACKGROUND INFORMATION

- 3.3 In light of changes, it was proposed that a new performance monitoring regime is required in order to assess the impact of the Partnership in its objective of making Bromley a Safer place. At the previous meeting of the Partnership, the following Control Strategy Priorities were agreed:
  - · Crimes against Property
  - Violence against Person
  - Anti-Social Behaviour
  - Public Confidence
- 3.5 These priorities are reflected in the performance framework established by the Metropolitan Police and, as such, it is proposed that these four indicators form the basis of the future performance management regime for the Safer Bromley Partnership. In relation to the first two priorities, it proposed that targets be set against the indictors of reducing Violent Crime and reducing Property Crime. A summary of the "portfolio" of offences and Anti Social Behaviour that are included within these overarching targets are provided at Appendix 1. As agreed in the last meeting, only the following four targets would be reported on at each meeting of the Strategic Group:



Performance Indicator 1 Reduction in number of violent crimes within Bromley

Performance Indicator 2 Reduction in number of property crimes within Bromley


Performance Indicator 3 Reduction in levels of recorded Anti Social Behaviour

Performance Indicator4 Increased confidence in the fact that Bromley is a safe place

Reporting on individual crime types and detail of individual operations would only be made as a routine if achievement against set targets was not being made or, in some cases, where the measurable rates of individual offences or types of offending were significantly different from expected trends and predicted patterns etc. The management of these operational level issues would be dealt with outside of the Strategic Group at the combined Police/Partnership Tactical Tasking and Coordination Group chaired by the borough Superintendent.

#### Performance Review 2011/2012


3.6 Significant progress has been made in relation to reducing crime and disorder in Bromley. This is reflected not only in the previous year's performance figures but also over the previous five quarters and the following charts provide an indication of the trends in crime in Bromley over the past five Quarters (July 2010 – September 2011).





#### Performance Indicator 1- Reduction in numbers of Violent crimes within Bromley


3.6 Offences related to Violent Crimes represent 21% of the Total Notifiable offences in the period of Quarter 2 this year



3.7 During the July 2011 to September 2011 there were 1154 Total Violent Offences reported to the Police, this represented a reduction of 46 offences compared with the same period previous year.

#### Performance Indicator 2- Reduction in numbers of Property Crimes within Bromley

3.8 Total offences to property Crimes represent 65% of the Total Notifiable offences in the period of Quarter 2 this year




3.9 As can be seen from the figure above, the trend does indicate as marked a reduction over the period of Q1 to Q2. From Q3, it does still indicate an increasing level of offences relates to property crimes but there was a decline in numbers in Q2.

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
3.10 During the July to September 2011 there were 3545 Total Property related Offences reported to the Police, this represented an increased of 274 offences compared with the same period previous year. This period included the August disorder, which accounts for a large proportion of this increased.

3.11 During the reporting period, the borough has experienced a reduction of 775 (11%) incidents of ASB reported when compared with the same period last year.




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3.12 As can be seen from the figure above, during the reporting period, the borough has experienced a reduction of 19 incidents of Noise and Nuisance ASB reported when compared with the same period last year.




3.13 July to September 2011 the borough has experienced an increase of 18 incidents of ASB reported when compared with the same period last year.

As have been introduced the Matrix reporting system for ASB at a higher level and targeting the most vulnerable. This is leading to an increase in referrals from Housing Associations, Police and Local Authority. In addition the Earn your travel back also lead to an increase. As the Matrix system is adopted by more agencies then there will be an increase in referrals. As the public become more aware of us they will report more.




3.14 As can be seen from the figure above, during the reporting period, the borough has experienced an increase of 12 incidents of Fly Tipping ASB reported when compared with the same period last year.

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3.15 This reporting period a reduction of 230 incidents reported to police regarding ASB compare with the same period last year.




3.16 As can be seen from the figure above, during the reporting period, the borough has experienced a reduction of 556 incidents of Graffiti ASB reported when compared with the same period last year. This could be for a number of reasons, increase community engagement, street friends taking a stronger role in the community, more PCSO on the street any of these could lead to less reports of graffiti being made.

Q74AB: To what extent do you agree that the police and local council are dealing with the ASB and crime issues that matter in this area? Base: all respondents



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





This report sets out the proposals to decrease the Community Safety Budget for 2012/13 in line with the expected reduction in Community Safety Grant.

#### 2. RECOMMENDATION

2.1 The Portfolio Holder is requested to agree the budget savings as set out in 3.7 and 5.3 totalling £164,350 for the 2012/13 budget for Community Safety.

#### 3. COMMENTARY

- 3.1 The funding that has been available for the delivery of community safety services within Bromley has always been made up of a combination of core funding and grant received from Central Government. The majority of this grant funding has been provided for the purpose of generic community safety activity, most recently, the Safer, Stronger Communities Fund but has also included more specific grants such as that received for Preventing Violent Extremism. In addition, various members of the Safer Bromley Partnership have historically made contributions towards the budgets for specific posts e.g. Metropolitan Police and Primary Care Trust.
- 3.2 The Community Safety budget for 2011/12 is part funded by LBB resources £524,020 and part funded by the new Community Safety Grant (£227,200), with a contribution from the Metropolitan Police of £15,000. This new grant replaced what was previously the Safer, Stronger Communities Fund grant. This new funding is now allocated via the Greater London Authority (GLA) in preparation for the future creation of Police and Crime Commissioners (PCCs).
- 3.3 In 2011/12, the decision was made by the GLA to simply 'passport' the grant allocations to each Borough based on previous years' allocation formula. Each local authority was required to submit a detailed spending plan for 2011/12 to the Mayor's Office for approval and there is a requirement for quarterly progress reports to be submitted to the GLA.
- 3.4 Notification was received from the Home Office in February 2011 advising Local Authorities that the 2011/12 grant was subject to cash reductions of 20% against the 2010/11 resource baseline and that the 2012/13 grant is expected to have a further cash reduction of 40% against the 2010/11 resource baseline, 60% in total. Assuming that Bromley will be allocated the full level of funding, the current 2011/12 Community Safety Grant for Bromley will be reduced by 50%, a loss of £113,600 for 2012/13.
- 3.5 It is expected that the new PCCs will hold the Community Safety Fund and will work closely with their local community partners. The Home Office have also indicated that other funding streams such as the Drug Interventions Programme grants will be consolidated with Community Safety Funding for 2013/14 and 2014/15 and thus provide a significantly larger unringfenced budget overall. Further detail is expected to explain transitional funding arrangements.
- 3.6 Each Authority has to make a case for the funding they believe should be in their community budget. It should be noted that there is no guarantee that Bromley will receive the full notional amount of grant (£113.6k), as an application will have to be submitted with a detailed spending plan. At this moment in time, Officers will assume that Bromley will have to reduce costs by at least £113,600, until such time as the funding level for 2012/13 is confirmed. In the mean time, Officers will have to begin to prepare a robust plan to ensure that Bromley can maximise funding. Should the actual funding level be less than the £113.6k, then further reductions in spend will have to be agreed to ensure a balanced budget for 2012/13.
- 3.7 In order to achieve this level of reduction in spend, Officers are proposing to make the following reductions to budgets: -
  - 1. Reduction in staffing within the Safer Neighbourhood/Anti-Social Behaviour teams totalling £56,250.
  - 2. The Portfolio Holder has agreed that the crime analyst posts for the Youth Offending Team (YOT) and Community Safety be merged into one post with effect from October 2011. The post would be located in Community Safety and spend 2.5 days a week undertaking YOT work. YOT have agreed to make a permanent contribution of £21,500 from 2012/13

- onwards with a part year contribution of £10k for 2011/12. In effect this would be a saving of £21,500 for the Community Safety Budget.
- 3. It is proposed to make the following reductions to the Portfolio Holder Grants from 2012/13 onwards: -

4. It is also proposed to reduce running expenses by £25k: -

3.8 In total, the proposed savings equal £164,350, which covers the assumed reduction in Community Safety Grant as well as providing £50,750 savings towards the Council's budget deficit for 2012/13.

#### 4. POLICY IMPLICATIONS

4.1 Reducing crime and disorder, providing reassurance and making Bromley safer are key elements of both Building a Better Bromley and the Safer Bromley Partnership's Strategic Assessment.

#### 5. FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

- 5.1 It is expected that the Community Safety Grant will reduce by at least £113,600 in 2012/13 and may be reduced even further depending on what level of funding is agreed by the Police and Crime Commissioners following the submission of a spending plan proposal for 2012/13. The Community Safety Budget must therefore be reduced initially by £113,600 until such time as the final allocation for 2012/13 is known. It may be that further savings will be required for 2012/13 in order to ensure a balanced budget.
- 5.2 In taking account of the Council's financial position as a whole, Members should also consider whether additional savings can be put forward from the Community Safety budget to help reduce the deficit the Council faces.

5.3 This report contains proposals to save £164,350. This will not only meet the reduction in budgets necessary to offset the expected minimum reduction in the Community Safety Grant funding for 2012/13 as well as providing an amount of £50,750 savings that can be used to help balance the overall Council's budget for 2012/13 as shown in the table below: -

- 5.4 Appendix 1 provides details of the changes to budgets as well as the proposed new split of budgets between LBB and grant funds compared to the 2011/12 position.
- 5.5 It should be noted that as a result of the proposed changes, the amount of staff funded by LBB increases by £53,750 to £278,390.
- 5.6 It is proposed to reduce staffing budgets by £56,250. Managers will ensure that the necessary staff consultation is undertaken.
- 5.7 There are likely to be redundancy implications arising from these proposals which will be met from the earmarked reserve set aside to meet redundancy costs as a result of agreed budget options.

#### 6. PERSONNEL

6.1 The proposals for reduction in staffing within the Safer Neighbourhood/Anti-Social Behaviour teams of £56,250 has redundancy implications and formal consultation, in line with the Council's procedures for managing change will take place with staff and staff representatives.

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#### **Safer Bromley Partnership**

**Response to the Home Office consultation** on a possible domestic violence disclosure scheme

Clare Elcombe, Domestic Abuse Strategy Coordinator December 2011

#### **General background:**

- s According to the British Crime Survey 10/11, domestic abuse comprises 18% of all violent incidents, and in the last financial year the CPS dealt with 74,113 cases of domestic abuse – an increase of 7009 cases from the previous year.
- s Over the last five years Police in Bromley have received an average of approximately 6000 reports of domestic abuse each year, with around 50% being classified as crimes.
- s Using Home Office data we can conservatively estimate that at least 15,000 individuals in Bromley experience domestic abuse each year.
- s Over the last 10 years between 111 and 146 people were murdered each year by their partner or ex-partner in the UK and there is no sign of any reduction in this trend.
- s Domestic abuse is rarely a one-off incident, generally being a pattern of abusive and controlling behaviour through which the abuser seeks power over their victim.
- s It has been estimated that across the UK domestic abuse in 2008 cost £15.7 billion in public services, loss to the economy and victims.

#### The consultation:

The case of Clare Wood, murdered by her ex-partner in Greater Manchester in 2009, brought to national attention the issue of disclosure of information regarding previous violent behaviour against different partners. Noting her former partner had three previous convictions under the Protection from Harassment Act 1997, the Coroner's report into the murder contained the following recommendation:

"subject to appropriate risk assessment and safeguard, I recommend that consideration should be given to the disclosure of such convictions and their circumstances to potential victims in order that they can make informed choices about matters affecting their safety and that of their children."

Additionally in 2009 Chief Constable Brian Moore of Wiltshire Police on behalf of ACPO set out ten recommendations in the report 'Tackling Perpetrators of Violence against Women and Girls' which included a 'right to know' - ie. that police should proactively disclose information to a new partner of an individual's previous domestic abuse history.

The Government seeks views on the following three options:

- Option 1: continue current arrangements under existing law where the police already have common law powers to disclose information relating to previous convictions or charges to person A where there is a pressing need for disclosure of the information concerning person B's history in order to prevent further crime. Note: this arrangement is not currently routinely used in situations of domestic abuse.
- Option 2: a "right to ask" national disclosure scheme which enables person A to ask the police about person B's history of domestic violence or violent acts where the police would undertake full checks to inform a disclosure. A precedent upon which suitable adaptations could be made exists with the Child Sex Offender Disclosure Scheme.
- Option 3: a "right to know" national disclosure scheme where the police would proactively disclose information in prescribed circumstances to person A relating to person B's

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previous history of domestic violence or violent acts (as envisaged in the ACPO report of 2009). *Note: it is proposed that this arrangement would be administered through the MARAC process, and therefore only individuals who have already been highlighted as high risk victims of domestic abuse would be considered for disclosure.* 

#### **Scope of Disclosure:**

Under the Child Sex Offender Disclosure Scheme information held by the police about a person should be categorised as either "concerns" or "no concerns".

Using this model, information disclosed under a "concerns" category under a domestic violence disclosure scheme could include:

- convictions for offences relating to domestic abuse including assault and harassment;
- convictions for other sexual or violent offences;
- allegations or intelligence about previous domestic violence incidents
- intelligence about previous civil injunctions(eg non-molestion orders)

A further question arises over the nature of the relationship between A and B before a disclosure is considered. The Child Sex Offender Disclosure Scheme guidance states that 'any person can make an application about a person (the subject) who has some form of contact with a child/children'. Under a Domestic Violence Disclosure Scheme, the Government proposes a criterion as follows: **any person can make an application about a person with whom they have entered an intimate relationship**

#### **Partnership Response:**

With the Partnership's agreement I would suggest that we send a response with the following issues highlighted and recommendations:

#### Issues:

- s Probable low uptake in right-to-ask
- s Probable low action in right-to-know
- s How do we identify new partners? (Suggestion is via MARAC)
- s Disclosure of 'concerns' currently would include unsubstantiated allegations
- s Management of risk when a disclosure is made

#### Recommendations for response:

- s Note probability of low uptake / action *but* emphasise that in cases where action is taken it could have potentially life-saving effects
- s Ask for both right-to-ask and right-to-know to be implemented to ensure as many victims / potential victims are protected
- s Removal of unsubstantiated allegations or tight guidance on what constitutes a 'concern', but that civil orders such as non-molestation orders are included.
- s That generalised violent behaviour not be included as this has not been shown to have a causal correlation to domestic abuse, but that sexual offenses and (if the offender is male) any general violence against women is included as both of these behaviours have strong links to domestic abuse.
- s That enquires can also be made by professionals working with a victim or potential victim i.e. social worker, support worker, health visitor, GP etc where they are concerned about a relationship; but that rights of enquiry are not extended to other third parties such as parents or siblings.

#### BCEF UPDATE FOR THE SAFER BROMLEY PARTNERSHIP MEETING ON 15 DECEMBER 2011

- 1. **New Chairman**: On 30<sup>th</sup> November, Judith Cross left the BCEF (moving to South Africa) and Ian Smith takes over as the BCEF Chairman.
- 2. **30 Nov public meeting**: with 92 people in attendance. Presentations included:
  - i. Borough Commander Charles Griggs, Cllr Tim Stevens and Nigel Davies gave a joint presentation on the disorder events and the police/council response/update. An excellent presentation which we have received tremendous positive feedback. Members and visitors spoke highly about the information given and the update on the arrests/investigation.
  - ii. Magistrate presentation, explaining the sentencing process and how they reach their decisions. Presented by Roger White (Deputy Bench Chair for the South East) and Angela Wilder (Legal Team Manager).
- 3. Youth Conference: BCEF's fourth annual Youth Conference will be held on Friday 23 March 2012. All LBB State secondary schools will be invited to send six of their Year 8 students to attend. Currently identifying the three workshops to be held around community safety. Letters sent to schools via Children & Young People Department.
- 4. Intergenerational Project: We are working with Veneratio (Bethany Russell) to set up an intergenerational project between older and younger people to introduce teenagers to their older "neighbours" to ensure a better understanding on both sides of the issue. Teenagers need to understand and respect the feelings of the older generation, ie the feeling of intimidation just on sight of groups of youngsters, no matter how innocent. A lot of youths are unaware of the impact this can have. We will happily keep you updated on this project.
