The update on the Tackling Troubled Families Programme was given by Mr Mark Thorn (Head of Referral, Assessment and Early Intervention).

The Group were informed that:

- Bromley had been set a target of 490 interventions and these had been achieved in full
- The target had been exceeded and 575 had been reached
- 94% of the targeted families had been "turned around"
- LBB was the 5th highest performing (out of 33) London Boroughs
- Phase 1 was a national agenda set without local consultation
- Phase 2 had commenced with local authority consultation

Mr Thorn briefed the Strategic Group that Phase 2 was a new five year programme and that LBB had a target to reach 1660 families. He explained that to be eligible for the expanded programme, each family had to be shown to have at least two of the following problems:

- Parents and Children involved in crime or antisocial behaviour
- Children that have not been attending school on a regular basis
- Children who need help
- Adults out of work and at risk of financial exclusion
- Families affected by domestic violence and abuse
- Parents and children with a range of health problems

The Group were informed that in order for LBB to benefit from "payment by results", it would need to be demonstrated that progress had been made, and that this progress was sustained. A Pan London agreement on a Tackling Troubled Families Outcome Plan was being developed. It was clear that this would require effective partnership working and to collate the data required to validate outcomes would be data intensive; the outcomes would also be subject to audit and scrutiny. If claims could not be validated, then LBB would lose the results based payment of £800.00 per family, and could end up with having to pay money back to the DCLG (Department for Communities and Local Government).

It was explained to the Board that the technology needed to be adequate so that data and information could be collated from all partners, which would subsequently stand up to audit and scrutiny. This project was going to be commissioned, and the plans for this would need to be signed off by the Tackling Troubled Families Strategic Board.

The Group heard that a designated domestic violence support worker would be assigned to work within the MASH (Multi Agency Support Hub) team at least once a week. It was acknowledged that Housing

	The Assistant Director stated that she had employed an experienced Youth Offending Team Manager on a six month contract to improve the Youth Offending Service and to support the new management board. The new manager would be tasked with developing an improvement plan across a variety of work streams.	
	The Group considered if a new and disparate Youth Offending Sub Group (reporting to the SBP) was necessary, given the number of boards that the Assistant Director was currently working with, and considering the current work involved in setting up and running a new Youth Offending Service Management Board. The Group felt that a new Group reporting to the SBP was probably not required.	
	The Assistant Director briefed the Group, that after a positive meeting with the Youth Justice Board, it had been agreed that the YJB, provide a consultant to work with the Youth Offending Service in identifying and developing youth offending priorities, and a youth offending priority report would be produced subsequently.

Welcome to the April edition of my BOCU Commander's Newsletter. As I write this month's edition, it's worth reflecting that we have just had a dramatic General Election with all four sitting MPs in the Borough being returned by the electorate. I would like pass on my congratulations to them. Secondly, this week has seen the seventieth anniversary of the VE Day with services of commemoration taking place across the country. I was fortunate to attend an event at St George's Chapel at Biggin Hill this morning and added my thanks to all those who served and made the ultimate sacrifice during the six years of the Second World War.

Crime update

Although MOPAC 7 crime continues to decrease, the rate of reduction has reduced to -1.5%, or 153 less offences. This reflects the challenges we currently have regarding theft of motor vehicle, which has risen by 176 offences, criminal damage (+258 offences) and Violence with injury offences (+338 offences). I hope many of you will noticed the extra officers patrolling in 'the Crays' and Mottingham in recent weeks to address the theft of mopeds and motorcycles which account for the majority of the increase in offences. There have been some significant arrests and we have deployed our own offroad motorcycles as a tactic but overwhelmingly, we need information from the community to identify who the riders are and where they store their vehicles. Burglary continues to reduce and is currently -16.5% (497 less offences) although we are reaching the time of year where sheds and garages are targeted, so please ensure yours are locked and secure. There are also excellent reductions in theft from motor vehicle (-247 offences), robbery (-133 offences) and theft person (-48 offences). I'm also very pleased that both confidence of the local community in their police and the satisfaction of victims has also crept up again.

Volunteer Police Cadets

This month I attended the Volunteer Police Cadet annual awards presentation and found myself in 1945. It was a pleasure to be presenting awards with the Mayor of Bromley, Julian Benington. Over a hundred cadets demonstrated their drill on the 'parade square', led and supported by the VPC staff in authentic MPS and military uniform to commemorate 70 years since VE Day. The ceremony moved inside where a number of awards were given to outstanding cadets who routinely support us with crime prevention initiatives and at community events. This was a fitting way to celebrate the VE Day anniversary.

Election Day

As you will have expected, this was a busy day for the MPS and my officers were on-duty to work with staff at both the Polling Stations and at the Count. I hope that some of you saw them and were able to talk with them as they visited the Polling Stations. They didn't report any issues although the high winds in the run up to to day may have had an impact on the marquee at the count if it had increased in strength on the night!

Operational News

Body Worn Video

This month saw Bromley officers secure the first Body-worn video (only) successful trial in London. The officers from my Community Safety Unit worked tirelessly to secure the first conviction based only on the evidence of body-worn video. The suspect had a long domestic abuse history and his various victims, including our one were unwilling to support a prosecution. Working closely with the CPS prosecutions, Met Prosecutions, staff at Bromley Mags and the BWV programme team, the contested trial went ahead and the defendant was found guilty and sentenced to six months imprisonment. The feedback regarding the initial investigation, victim care and trial preparation was excellent and I'm confident we will learn valuable lessons from this investigation to help future victims.

• Heartbeat 'Bromley style' or day in the life of a Bromley Duty Inspector

Insp Chris Wood recently transferred to the Met from West Yorkshire Police where he was a Detective Inspector. I thought you would like to hear how he has taken to our Borough in his own words.

'Swapping West Yorks for Met was an easy decision but the reality was more daunting. My previous role as a senior detective involved overseeing numerous complex and lengthy investigations. I wasn't sure what to expect in my new role. Training has its place in the Police Service, however there is no substitute for actually doing the job and I was soon let loose on my new team. I quickly realised that I had actually missed the buzz of responding to emergency calls and that the typical day for a Duty Officer in Bromley Borough is anything other than monotonous. A particularly busy night shift recently, started with an incident whereby I authorised police protection proceedings for two young children after they were found with injuries after an assault. There were then many other routine calls that needed investigating by my team, leaving little time for anything but a quick sandwich and cup of coffee. The shift ended with an emergency call at a local bank that had been targeted by thieves using inflammable gas to try to gain access to the cash machine. Fortunately they were unsuccessful, but that didn't prevent my officers being put in a dangerous situation on arrival and one that required the specialist assistance of London Fire Brigade and MPS Explosives experts to make safe. We had a great shift and met all of our response targets whilst arresting some villains as well. I have always loved being a Detective and relished the challenges that investigating crime brings, however I am quickly finding out that if you want to test yourself on a daily basis, the role of Duty Officer is the place to be.'

The recent passing of an awarded Bromley Police Officer

This month saw the death of retired PC Ivan King. PC King and two colleagues received the George Medal in 1950 for thwarting a burglary in Biggin Hill by three armed men, during which they were shot at. Despite this they made the arrests and were rewarded by King George VI. PC King died peacefully at home in Yorkshire at the age of 89. I wrote to his wife to pass on the condolences and best wishes of all of us in Bromley.

Contacting the police in Bromley

There are a number of ways that you can contact the police.

If a crime is currently taking place and you are in immediate danger, please always dial 999.

If you wish to contact the Metropolitan Police Service and it is not an emergency, please call our non-emergency number, 101. You can request a visit from a local officer within 48 hours via this number too.

Certain categories of crime or incidents committed in the London area can now be reported over the internet, as long as an urgent response is not required. Please visit the MPS website for further information – www.met.police.uk

You can also contact any of our Neighbourhood Policing Teams by telephone or email – visit the MPS website www.met.police.uk, type your postcode into the team finder and you'll be directed to your local team's webpage which contains their contact details.

In non-emergency situations you can visit any Front Counter:

- Bromley Police Station, High Street, Bromley, BR1 1ER has a front counter open 24 hours a day
- Penge SNT base, Maple Road, Penge, SE20 8RE is open:

Monday to Friday (excluding public holidays) between 11am - 7 pm (closed 3pm-4pm).

• West Wickham SNT base, 9 High Street, West Wickham, BR4 0LP is open:

Monday and Thursday: 1pm - 4pm Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday: 10am - 1pm

There are also currently three Contact Points across the Borough. Contact points provide a convenient opportunity to speak to the local police face to face. They are an alternative to visiting a police station front counter for non urgent issues. These are:

- Biggin Hill SNT base, 192-194 Main Road, Biggin Hill, TN16 3BB
- Cray Valley SNT base, 43 45 High Street, St Mary Cray, BR5 3NJ
- Green Street Green SNT base, 49 High Street, Green St Green, BR6 6BG
