| | The Group heard that new directions for priorities had not been received from the London Mayor's office. In view of this performance was still being measured against the MOPAC 7 targets. In the MET generally, the performance levels against MOPAC 7 were now either slowing or reversing; this was not the case in Bromley where there was now a 21% reduction in overall crime. These figures were positive and encouraging. Conversely, detection rates had declined slightly. | |
| | Bromley police were in the process of adopting restorative justice practices. Mayoral funding had been provided for this. It was felt that it would take time for the new practices to be reflected in the figures. | |
| | Bromley police intended to add one Ward Officer to each Ward, so that each Ward would have two Ward Officers; this process had been started, and some wards were already operating with two Ward Officers. PCSO's still worked with Ward Officers, and it was the case that Bromley police were over allocation. The PCSO's had been asked by the MET to identify where they would prefer to be based, as an exercise to redistribute resources was taking place. The extra PCSO's had been used to bolster the Town Centre Team and to promote the uptake of 'Smart Water'. Due to the successful uptake of 'Smart Water' in Bromley, extra kits had been supplied. | |

| | Ms Roberts referred to minute 64 of the Matters Arising report concerning the setting up of the DV and VAWG Strategic Group. It was noted that this group was having its first meeting in October, and that Superintendent Lawry would be drafting the Terms of Reference. It was noted that the MARAC Steering Group referred to in the matters arising report had now been set up. | |
| | Ms Roberts informed the Strategic Group that the DHR Task and Finish Group had met the previous day (14 th September). The 16 Home Office recommendations had now been completed, and would be sent to the Home Office after sign off from the SBP. | |
| | A report on domestic violence and violence against women and girls was presented by Victoria Roberts, the Interim DV and VAWG Commissioner. | |

| | The LBB Assistant Director for Public Protection wondered why there had been an increase in the number of referrals for domestic abuse. It was felt that the reason for this was not that DV was increasing, but rather that the service had been refreshed, and that there was now a greater awareness of how to report DV, and of the relevant support services that could be provided. The Chairman was also pleased to note the number of referrals coming from the 'Bromley One Stop Shop', and from self-referrals. | |
| | The Violence against Women and Girls Strategy 2016-2019 had been circulated to members of the Group by email prior to the meeting. Questions or comments from SBP Group members concerning the | |

strategy should be emailed to Victoria Roberts by close of play on 30th September 2016. It was anticipated that the Strategy would be launched on 25th November, supported by public awareness campaigns.

Ms Roberts referenced the report that had been looked at by the Executive the previous evening. This was the Gateway Review Report on Domestic Violence Against Women and Girls Services.

The report outlined key recommendations and a proposed timetable for the commissioning of the Domestic Violence (DV) and Violence Against Women and Girls (VAWG) services in the London Borough of Bromley. The funding would be entirely dependent on the success of MOPAC bids that would be submitted. The current contracts expire on the 31 March 2017.

Members of the Executive were asked to:

- Agree that officers market test the Domestic Violence and Violence against Women and Girls Services, beginning a formal procurement process offering the service as a single contract from 1st April 2017, for an estimated total value of £220k per annum to March 2020.
- Note that officers will be submitting an application for MOPAC funding for this service to cover the period April 2017 to March 2020.

The Strategic Group were informed that the recommendations were accepted by the Executive, and were confident that the relevant funding would be provided by MOPAC.

The Chairman asked if it was appropriate to increase public awareness concerning the Safer Bromley Van. Ms Roberts responded that she was aware of the relevant issues concerning the Safer Bromley Van, and that there were issues that needed addressing. It was the case that the SBV was behind in terms of referral targets. She suggested that more information concerning the SBV be brought to the next meeting.

The Chairman was happy with the way that the various groups were progressing.

Policing and Crime Plan

Police and Crime Plans are a statutory requirement for all police force areas introduced as part of the Police Reform and Social Responsibility Act 2011.

The Policing and Crime Plan currently being drafted will cover the new Mayoral period 2017- 2021. It must be published by the 31st March and it must have public consultation (12 weeks). This is likely to be from Nov through to Jan.

It was noted that Anne Ball's contract had been extended to October 2017, and would continue to be the single point of contact to MOPAC for Bromley.

The Chairman felt that a MOPAC update should be a standing item on the agenda for the foreseeable future.

Conal Percy from the London Ambulance Service informed the Group that a Pan London referral service for domestic abuse had been developed by agreement between LAS and Women's Aid. There was also a brief update on co-responding between LFB, MPS and LAS.

Co responding trials were now over. Both MPS and LFB had agreed to continue the schemes without hesitation.

LFB ran in Lambeth, Wandsworth, Merton and Newham. LFB are not making any firm decisions about extending the scheme until February next year.

MPS runs in Croydon, Enfield and Ealing – soon to be extended to Havering.

Trading Standards get house back from rogue trader

A 78-year-old man from Orpington, conned out of his £250,000 house, was relieved to get it back thanks to action from Bromley Trading Standards. A Lincolnshire-based man was jailed for five years after being found guilty of conspiracy to commit fraud when he tricked the older gentleman into signing over his house in exchange for property repairs.

Mr B was cold-called back in 2013 and agreed with the caller that he needed house repairs though did not have enough money to pay for them. The conman hatched a deal whereby the householder would get the maintenance done in exchange for some of the equity in the house, while continuing to live there until he died. Mr B was coerced into signing paperwork which, unknown to him, signed over the entire house to the crook. He was forced to move out.

Trading Standards were alerted by a worried neighbour and undertook a lengthy investigation resulting in the conman being jailed and a happy ending for Mr B when his house was returned to him.

The Judge presiding over the case told the conman: "You, together with your co-conspirators, gained an elderly man's trust. You led him to believe you were helping him, but nothing could be further from the truth. You callously deceived him into transferring his house to you."

Cllr Kate Lymer said: "This was a disgraceful and shameful offence. Mr B showed tremendous courage to attend court and give evidence, and has since been recognised for his bravery by the Chartered Institute of Trading Standards with a Hero Award."

Playing it Safe

Bromley Youth Council has been looking at young people's attitudes to personal safety in the Borough and online.

Bromley Youth Council will soon be launching a new short personal safety film aimed at younger people. The film, written, produced and acted by local young people will address three main issues: peer pressure, internet safety and reporting crime. Scenes demonstrate what happens when young people succumb to pressure from friends to act inappropriately, how befriending strangers online can result in devastating outcomes, and the consequences of not reporting a crime. The film will be posted on YouTube and Youth Council members will approach schools to raise awareness of these issues.

The Youth Council backed up their campaign with findings from a survey which showed that despite the fact that many young people who took part thought Bromley was safer than most places, they still worried about crime. The survey also revealed they had concerns about their personal safety in a number of situations and that they were unsure about their rights and responsibilities around reporting crime.

Linda King from Bromley's Youth Support Team said: "We hope that using the medium of video will be a very accessible way to get practical safety messages across to young people in an increasingly digital age."

Clampdown on fly-tippers

Fly-tipping and other enviro-crimes are Safer Bromley Partnership priorities. Police and Bromley Council are teaming up as part of the 'Fly-tippers – we're watching you' campaign to clamp down on fly-tipping and other waste crimes. Collaboration on 'stop and search' operations allows vehicles

to be checked and unscrupulous traders apprehended before they dump waste to avoid disposal fees. Traders carrying waste must produce a waste carrier's licence or their vehicle could be seized and they may be fined. Other measures include CCTV surveillance, Fixed Penalty Notices (FPNs), prosecution and intelligence gathering. Report fly-

tipping and enviro-crime to the Police and tell the Council too. A description of the offender, vehicle registration or photo is useful. There are rewards up to £500 if evidence leads to prosecution.

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Bromley exceeds crime reduction target



Bromley has come through the four year 'MOPAC 7' crime reduction challenge with flying colours. Crime is down by 21 per cent in Bromley across the seven specified crime types. This compares favourably with an average of 17 per cent fewer crimes across London.

"We talk in numbers and percentages but the important thing to remember is that each statistic refers to a person in the Borough who has been a victim of crime," said Police Borough Commander Chris Hafford. "So with our total of 9,282 offences, this means 2,468 fewer victims than four years ago which is clearly a good thing. But this is only part of what we do. The number of Total Notifiable Offences recorded in Bromley is just over 20,000 and this is also reducing from 21,000 last year. Bromley is one of only four Boroughs with a reduction in these offences which include crimes associated with drugs and public order.

"Conversely, there have been increases Londonwide in sexual offences and hate crimes. Bromley has seen 47 of the former amounting to a 14 per cent increase, as well as a rise in the latter since the EU Referendum in June."

The Metropolitan Police Service has saved some £600 million towards the 2020 target and has a further £400 million to save. This has been achieved by reducing staff numbers, selling inefficient buildings and other efficiencies to maintain numbers at 32,000 Police officers across London. Bromley currently has 440 officers, over strength by 20 officers and 20 PCSOs, although this will change in the coming months.

"We have been using the extra officers to do things differently," said the Borough Commander, "developing initiatives such as our Met Trace and Town Centre Teams for Bromley and Orpington as well as establishing teams for intelligence and development and to improve investigation standards. We are in a good place to meet the challenges that lie ahead," he concluded. "I have a motivated and committed workforce who will continue to work in partnership and listen to our communities to continue to make Bromley even safer."

Met Trace makes its mark

An invisible liquid – Met Trace – which enables residents' belongings to be identified under UV light is having a significant impact on crime in areas where it is widely used.

In households covered during phase one of a campaign during which local Police distributed free kits, residential burglary has dropped by 37.5 per cent in the areas covered. Bromley Police handed out 3,681 Met Trace kits during this initial phase, aiming to reach 85 per cent of homes in areas considered at higher risk of burglary, such as Cray Valley East, Cray Valley West, Anerley and Crystal Palace. Buoyed by the initial success, a second phase has seen Police distribute 2,500 kits, with another 1,440 to go, in new areas including West Wickham, Petts Wood and Knoll and Penge and Cator.

Trevor Lawry, Bromley's Deputy Police Borough Commander, said: "Applying a traceable liquid which cannot be removed and is only visible under UV light along with notices to warn would-be criminals that this is in use has proved successful in preventing burglary in areas where sufficient homes take up the offer. I hope that many more residents will use the kits especially now we have demonstrated their worth here in the Borough."



Good Neighbours Stop Rogue Traders

Residents of Bromley can make a real contribution to keeping vulnerable people safe – and get a certificate and medal for their trouble. Donna rang the

Trading Standards Rapid Response number when she spotted some men on her neighbour's property. She was concerned as he had previously been a victim of a rogue trader. When officers investigated it was apparent that, although no criminal offences had been committed, the over-enthusiastic trader had arranged to carry out property repairs totalling thousands of pounds when only a small repair was wanted. Officers helped the resident cancel the contract. Presenting the award to Donna, Rob Vale, Head of Trading Standards and Community Safety, said: "Without Donna's intervention, there was potential for this person to become overwhelmed and anxious at what he had agreed to." www.bromley.gov.uk/roguetraders

Plan tackles community safety issues

Members of the Safer Bromley Partnership are committed to ensuring Bromley remains one of the safest places to live and work. The Partnership has set out its strategic priorities to tackle community safety issues over the next three years. The focus will be on:

- Domestic Abuse
- Preventing Violent Extremism
- Reducing Reoffending
- Serious Youth Violence including gangs
- Enviro-crime and related anti-social behaviour

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London aims to be safest city

London's blue light services are working together to make London one of the safest cities in the world.

London Fire Commissioner Ron Dobson told the Bromley Crime Summit audience that, with further collaboration between emergency services and local authorities, he believed making London a safe global city is eminently achievable.

"We want to respond in the most appropriate, effective and efficient way and increase knowledge of safety regarding fire, crime and security," he said.

"Collaborative working and prevention are at the heart of this mission. The London Fire Brigade's (LFB) move to the Home Office aligns the governance of the Fire and Police services so supports working this way. Now we want to increase visibility and communication between the LFB, Metropolitan Police Service and Local Authorities. This approach will also help reduce public expenditure through prevention of unnecessary response, secondary investigations and on-going health care, as well as increased intelligence on fire related incidents and crime."

Commissioner Dobson acknowledged that Bromley's Borough Commanders already work well in partnership to reduce the risk of emergencies and bring together Borough based knowledge and expertise. Delivery of a range of youth engagement projects such as Cadets, Local Intervention and Fire Education (LIFE) programmes make a real difference. School visits and work with juvenile fire setters so they appreciate the consequences of their actions help too. Sharing intelligence to reduce antisocial behaviour fire-related incidents is also well developed in Bromley.

"We want to build on this good work and make sure people and communities know about safety to help prevent them becoming a target so some emergencies will not occur in the first place," added the Commissioner.

- ✓ Make sure you have smoke alarms on at least every level of your home.
- Smoke alarms save lives, but only if they're working. Test them regularly.
- ✓ Stub cigarettes out properly and dispose of them carefully.

- ✓ Plan your escape route and make sure everyone knows how to get out in a fire
- ✓ Take extra care in the kitchen and never leave cooking unattended.
- Do not overload electrical sockets and watch out for faulty and over-heating electrical equipment, wiring and cables.

Scam alert

Keep a look out for trusting and vulnerable family, friends and neighbours.

Criminals are still targeting Bromley residents through a variety of scams as well as rogue trading offences. Trading Standards and Police are working together to put a stop to their antics, but we need your help.

Don't forget:

- Anyone attempting to gain information or bank cards is committing FRAUD.
- Neither the Police, or any bank, will ever ask for your bank details or bank cards and will never need to collect them.
- Police will never ask you to withdraw money from your account to help investigate a crime. This is FRAUD.

At the door step:

- Say NO to any uninvited sales people or any workmen.
- Criminals will convince you that you need work completed.
- Reputable traders will be happy to make an appointment at a time to suit you and they will NEVER insist on cash payments.

If you receive a bogus call end it,

and if possible, use another phone to call Police. If you don't have another phone, consider asking a neighbour to call Police for you as the criminals will try to keep the line open. Phone someone whose voice you recognise.
