3. COMMENTARY

3.1.Licensing Act 2003.

The Licensing Act 2003 states that any premises require a licence/certificate issued by the Council (premises licence/club premises certificate) where the following activities occur:-

Provision of regulated entertainment

- a) Plays. (Where the audience exceeds 500 people)
- b) Films.
- c) Indoor sporting events. (Where the audience exceeds 1000 people)
- d) Boxing or wrestling entertainment.
- e) Live music. (subject to the Live Music Act 2013 exemptions)
- f) Recorded music.
- g) Performances of dance. (Where the audience exceeds 500 people)

Provision of late night refreshment (between 2300hrs and 0500hrs).

Supply of alcohol (on and off sales).

The supply of alcohol by or on behalf of a club to, or to the order of, a member of the club.

The sale by retail of alcohol by or on behalf of a club to a guest of a member of the club for consumption on the premises where the sale takes place.

Licences/Certificates may be issued subject to any terms, conditions or restrictions the Council feels are appropriate to address any or all of the four licensing objectives.

The Council has previously agreed Bromley's Statement of Licensing Policy for the Period 2016 – 2021.

The Licensing Sub-Committee must consider the Statement of Licensing Policy and any Special Policy of Cumulative Impact currently in force when making any decisions in respect of these applications.

Members' attention is drawn to the following parts of the policy which are relevant to this application

Description of the Premises

The premise sits on Perry Street in Chislehurst and is shown in the google maps image in appendix 5. It comprises of a petrol forecourt store selling a broad range of groceries, household products and alcohol. The premise has operated since the commencement of the Licensing Act 2003 and has had a licence since 2005. The current premises licence shown in appendix 2.

Licensing History

The premise was subject to a similar application for 24/7 opening in 2014 which was subsequently granted following a hearing of the licensing subcommittee with amended hours. A copy of the decision notice from that hearing is contained within the premise history in appendix 4.

The current licence is shown at Appendix 2.

Details of the Application

- 1.To extend the hours for the sale of alcohol to 24 hours a day 7 days a week.
- 2.To remove all 6 conditions under the title 'Crime and Disorder' of the premises licence.
- 3.To replace the above conditions with the conditions in boxes b to e of Section 16 of this application

Representations

During the public consultation period the Council received 6 representations against the application. Copies of these are contained in appendix 3

4. IMPACT ON VULNERABLE ADULTS AND CHILDREN

- 4.1 Licensing regimes provide for additional controls through specific permissions to undertake activities. Both the Licensing Act 2003 and Gambling Act 2005 contain licensing objectives which seek to protect particular vulnerable groups. In the case of the Licensing Act 2003 it seeks to protect children from harm whereas the licensing objectives under the Gambling Act 2005 are wider and seek to protect children and vulnerable adults from being harmed or exploited.
- 4.2 Businesses and the Council are required to promote these objectives in the way they operate or make decisions.
- 4.3 Details of applications under both Acts are referred to the appropriate safeguarding teams for comment.

5. POLICY IMPLICATIONS

- 5.1 Both the Licensing Act 2003 and the Gambling Act 2005 require the Council to prepare, consult on and publish statements of their licensing policy. These must be reviewed at least every 5 years under the Licensing Act and 3 years under the Gambling Act.
- 5.2 Members should make decisions in accordance with these policies but are free to depart from them with good reason.

6. FINANCIAL & LEGAL IMPLICATIONS

- 6.1 There are rights of appeal to the Magistrates Court against the decision of the Sub-Committee under both the Licensing and Gambling Acts. If an appeal were to be lodged there are costs associated with defending it. These are difficult to quantify and the Courts can award costs. In the event of a successful appeal we could pay the costs of the appellant as well as our own. Equally if we successfully defended an appeal, it is open to the Court to order our costs to be paid by the appellant.
- 6.2 Parties involved in a hearing before a Sub-Committee can also seek a Judicial Review if the Local Authority has failed to administer the hearing in accordance with proper procedures.
- 6.3 The Council has adopted a procedure for the conduct of hearings.

b) The prevention of crime and disorder

1. A digital CCTV system will be installed, or the existing system maintained, such system to be fit for the purpose.
2. The CCTV system shall be capable of producing immediate copies on site. Copies of recordings will either be recorded digitally on to CD/DVD or other equivalent medium.
3. Any recording will be retained and stored in a suitable and secure manner for a minimum of 31 days and shall be made available, subject to compliance with Data Protection legislation, to the police for inspection on request.
4. The precise positions of the cameras may be agreed, subject to compliance with Data Protection legislation, with the police from time to time.
5. The system will display, on any recording, the correct time and date of the recording.
6. The CCTV system will be maintained and fully operational throughout the hours that the premises are open for any licensable activity.

c) Public safety

The premises licence holder will at all times maintain adequate levels of staff. Such staff levels will be disclosed, on request, to the licensing authority and police.

d) The prevention of public nuisance

Adequate waste receptacles for use by customers shall be provided in and immediately outside the premises.

e) The protection of children from harm

The premises licence holder will ensure that an age verification policy will apply to the premises whereby all cashiers will be trained to ask any customer attempting to purchase alcohol, who appears to be under the age of 25 years (or older if the licence holder so elects) to produce, before being sold alcohol, identification being a passport or photocard driving licence bearing a holographic mark or other form of identification that complies with any mandatory condition that may apply to this licence.

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NOTES ON REGULATED ENTERTAINMENT

In terms of specific **regulated entertainments** please note that:

- Plays: no licence is required for performances between 08:00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
- Films: no licence is required for 'not-for-profit' film exhibition held in community premises between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day provided that the audience does not exceed 500 and the organiser (a) gets consent to the screening from a person who is responsible for the premises; and (b) ensures that each such screening abides by age classification ratings.
- Indoor sporting events: no licence is required for performances between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the audience does not exceed 1000.
- Boxing or Wrestling Entertainment: no licence is required for a contest, exhibition or display of Greco-Roman wrestling, or freestyle wrestling between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the audience does not exceed 1000. Combined fighting sports – defined as a contest, exhibition or display which combines boxing or wrestling with one or more martial arts – are licensable as a boxing or wrestling entertainment rather than an indoor sporting event.
- Live music: no licence permission is required for:
 - o a performance of unamplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, on any premises.
 - o a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day on premises authorised to sell alcohol for consumption on those premises, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
 - o a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, in a workplace that is not licensed to sell alcohol on those premises, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
 - o a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, in a church hall, village hall, community hall, or other similar community premises, that is not licensed by a premises licence to sell alcohol, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance from a person who is responsible for the premises.
 - o a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, at the non-residential premises of (i) a local authority, or (ii) a school, or (iii) a hospital, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance on the relevant premises from: (i) the local authority concerned, or (ii) the school or (iii) the health care provider for the hospital.
- Recorded Music: no licence permission is required for:
 - o any playing of recorded music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day on premises authorised to sell alcohol for consumption on those premises, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
 - o any playing of recorded music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, in a church hall, village hall, community hall, or other similar community premises, that is not licensed by a premises licence to sell alcohol, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance from a person who is responsible for the premises.
 - o any playing of recorded music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, at the non-residential premises of (i) a local authority, or (ii) a school, or (iii) a hospital, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance on the relevant premises from: (i) the local authority concerned, or (ii) the school proprietor or (iii) the health care provider for the hospital.

- Dance: no licence is required for performances between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the audience does not exceed 500. However, a performance which amounts to adult entertainment remains licensable.
- Cross activity exemptions: no licence is required between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, with no limit on audience size for:
 - o any entertainment taking place on the premises of the local authority where the entertainment is provided by or on behalf of the local authority;
 - o any entertainment taking place on the hospital premises of the health care provider where the entertainment is provided by or on behalf of the health care provider;
 - o any entertainment taking place on the premises of the school where the entertainment is provided by or on behalf of the school proprietor; and
 - o any entertainment (excluding films and a boxing or wrestling entertainment) taking place at a travelling circus, provided that (a) it takes place within a moveable structure that accommodates the audience, and (b) that the travelling circus has not been located on the same site for more than 28 consecutive days.

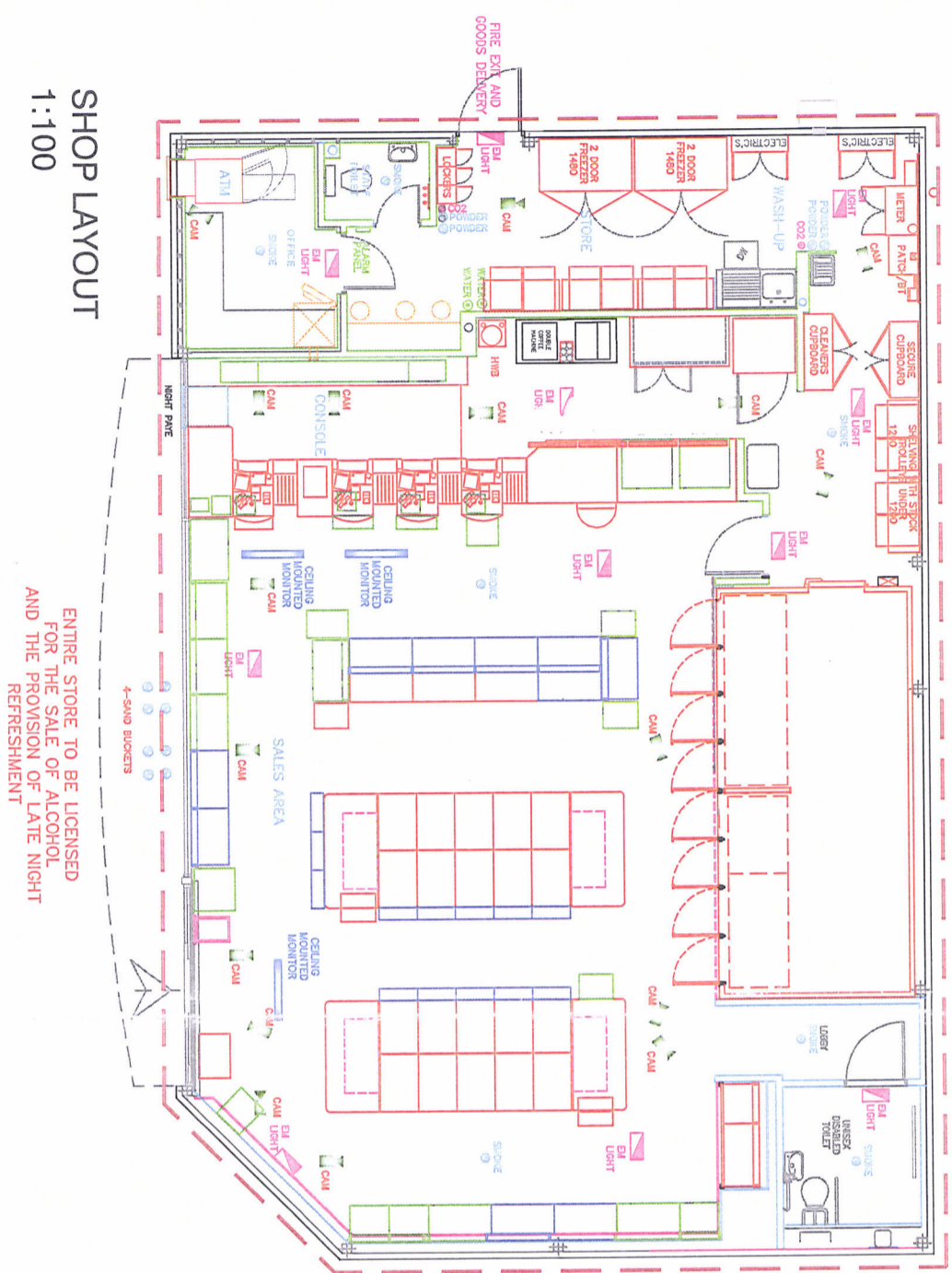

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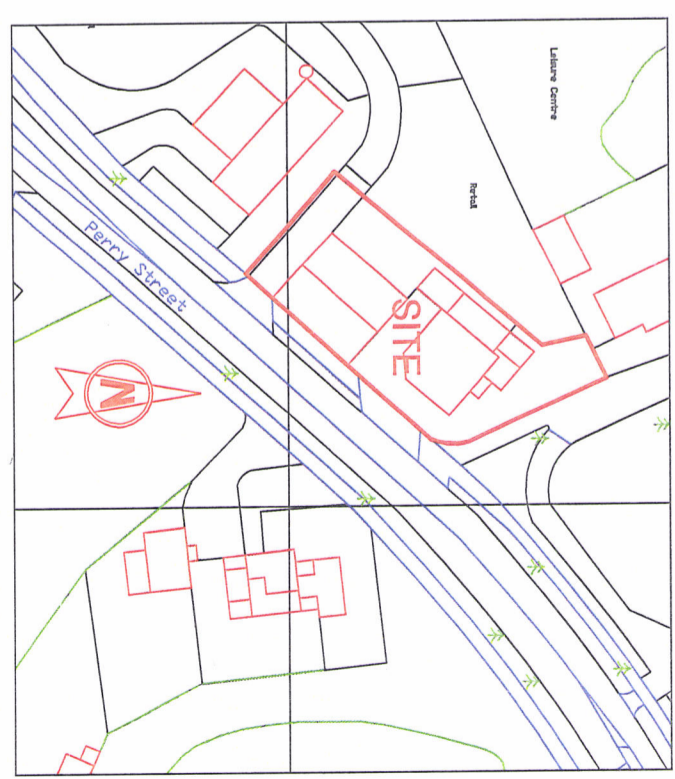

3. Application for a variation of the Premises Licence for "BP Connect", Perry Street, Chislehurst, Kent, BR7 6HA.

Decision:

1. The Panel has made the following decision having regard to:

- the four licensing objectives,
- the Council's Statement of Licensing Policy 2011 – 2016
- Guidance issued under the Licensing Act 2003
- Written and oral representations from the Applicant
- Written representations from Local Residents
- Written and oral representations from Metropolitan Police
- Written and oral representations by Local Ward Councillor

The panel decided to grant the application, amended by the applicant as follows:

Hours for supply of alcohol shall be 6am to midnight, 7 days a week.

Subject to the following conditions:

1. All conditions in operating schedule, with the exception that condition number 3 listed in part b) of section M of the application shall be amended to read as follows:-

Any recording shall be retained and stored in a suitable and secure manner for a minimum of 28 days and shall be made available within a reasonable time, subject to compliance with Data Protection legislation, to the police for inspection on request."

2. All staff engaged or to be engaged in the sale of alcohol on the premises shall receive the following training in age restricted sales:

- Induction training which must be completed and documented prior to the sale of alcohol by the staff member.
- Refresher / reinforcement training at intervals of no more than 6 months.

Training records will be available for inspection by a police officer or other authorised officer on request.

3. All cashiers shall be trained to record refusals of sales of alcohol in a refusals book / register. The book / register will contain:

- Details of the time and date the refusal was made;
- The identity of the staff member refusing the sale;
- Details of the alcohol the person attempted to purchase.

This book / register will be available for inspection by a police officer or other authorised officer on request.

4. An incident book / register shall be maintained to record:

- all incidents of crime and disorder occurring at the premises;
- details of occasions when the police are called to the premises.

This book / register will be available for inspection by a police officer or other authorised officer on request.

Reasons for decision:

This is an application for a variation of an existing licence. Police concerns were raised in respect of the primary use of the premises, but it was pointed out that a discussion could not take place on this point as this is not an application for a new licence, and the sub-committee should limit its consideration to the impact of the grant of the variation sought, upon the licensing objectives.

The applicant reduced the hours sought in the variation application from 24 hours, 7 days a week, to 6am to midnight, 7 days a week.

The applicant explained that the renewed premises would comprise a “Marks and Spencer” convenience store on the site of the former “BP Connect” shop. It would have 3 - 4 senior staff who will be qualified to act as Designated Premises Supervisors.

The Police and Ward Councillor expressed concerns that, whilst there had been no major problems identified with the premises to date, that there was an element of antisocial behaviour which could escalate if the licensing hours were extended. They also expressed concern regarding the protection of

children passing or entering the premises during the extended hours which were sought.

The relevant legislation, government guidance and case law tell us that each case must be considered on its individual merits and that decisions must be evidence based and not speculative. Guidance also states that unless a good reason is demonstrated to the contrary, licensing hours in shop premises should seek to match the opening hours for the premises.

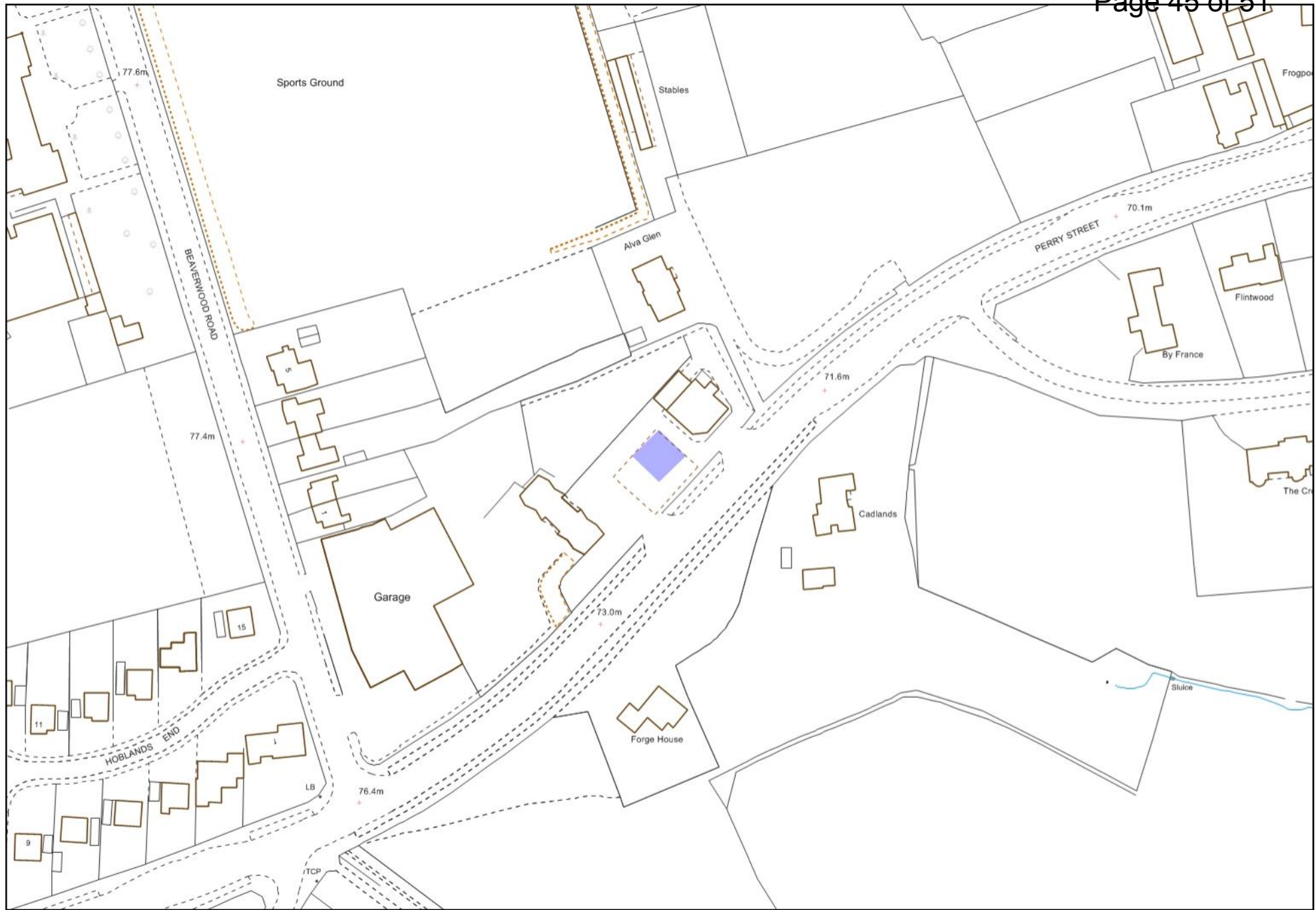
Whilst the Police did not feel that they could consent to the variation in light of their reservations on matters generally, they did come to an agreement as to acceptable conditions for the promotion of the licensing objectives, if the sub-committee was minded to grant the application.

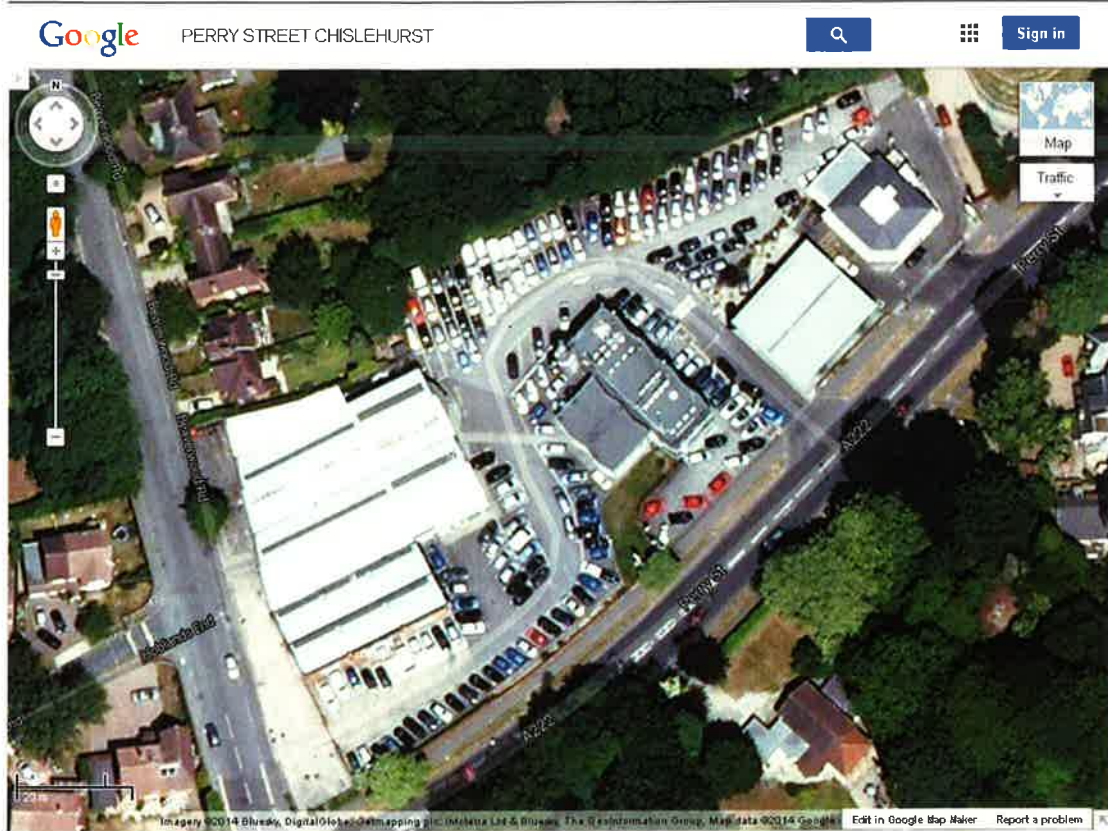
Whilst the sub-committee accepts the concerns of local residents and police, they took the view that there was insufficient evidence to show that the granting of the variation as amended, with appropriate conditions, would have a significantly detrimental effect upon the Licensing Objectives. The committee therefore took the view that the granting of the amended variation was reasonable and proportionate in the circumstances.

Current Policy(Extract)

Late Night Refreshment with Alcohol for consumption off the premises

The Licensing Authority is concerned about the potential for crime and disorder and public nuisance from premises that remain open late for the sale of late night refreshment and where alcohol is sold for consumption off the premises.

Where such applications are received the Licensing Authority will consider them very closely and will expect the applicant to satisfy them that the grant of the licence would have no detrimental impact on the promotion of the licensing objectives.

Garages and motorway service areas

Section 176 of the 2003 Act prohibits the sale or supply of alcohol at motorway service areas (MSAs) and from premises which are used primarily as a garage, or are part of premises used primarily as a garage. Premises are used primarily as a garage if they are used for one or more of the following:

- the retailing of petrol;
- the retailing of derv;
- the sale of motor vehicles; and
- the maintenance of motor vehicles.

It is for the Licensing Authority to decide, based on the licensing objectives, whether it is appropriate for that premises to be granted a licence, taking into account the documents and information listed in section 17(3) and (4) of the Licensing Act 2003 which must accompany the application.



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
