1. Reason for report

This report seeks approval to a change in age range at Worsley Bridge Community Junior School from 7-11 to 4-11, with effect from 1 September 2013. This was the subject of a statutory notice procedure which is now complete. It is linked to a proposal to change the age range at Bromley Road Infants School also on this agenda.

2. RECOMMENDATION(S)

That the Education Portfolio Holder approves a change in age range at Worsley Bridge Community Junior School from 7-11 to 4-11 with effect from 1 September 2013 as set out in the statutory notice attached as Appendix A, the school to be known as Worsley Bridge Community Primary School.

Corporate Policy

- 1. Policy Status: Existing: There is also a commitment to investigate the potential for amalgamation of infant and junior schools whenever the opportunity arises. In this case, as the schools are on separate sites, the proposal is to create two free standing primary schools.
- 2. BBB Priority: Children and Young People

Financial

- 1. Cost of proposal: Estimated Cost The capital cost of this proposal is estimated at £400,000 to provide the additional classrooms and ancillary spaces needed for a 2 form entry all through school to current DfE standards.
- 2. Ongoing costs: Recurring Cost The recurring costs will be met through the school's delegated budget. The total, taken together with the linked proposal for Bromley Road Infants, is expected to be broadly the same as the two schools in their present form of organisation.
- 3. Budget head/performance centre: Basic Need Capital Programme
- 4. Total current budget for this head: £19.73m
- 5. Source of funding: DfE Basic Need Grant

Customer Impact

1. Estimated number of users/beneficiaries (current and projected) At present the capacity of the school is 360 children and the roll is 164. When the proposal is fully implemented the planned capacity will rise to 420, plus two temporary bulge classes of 60 making a total of 480.

3. COMMENTARY

On 6 November 2012, the Education Portfolio Holder, following consideration by the Education PDS Committee, authorised the Director of Education and Care Services to undertake consultation with schools and other key agencies on a number of changes to primary schools, one of which one was to alter the age range at Bromley Road Infants and Worsley Bridge Junior Schools in order to create all through schools, and with the potential to expand for Worsley Bridge to expand to 3 FE.

This consultation was undertaken informally during January to March 2013, and following a successful outcome the Portfolio Holder resolved to proceed with formal statutory proposals to implement these changes. The consultation was on the basis that both schools would become all through from September 2014.

Subsequently it became necessary to identify additional reception class places in the area for the academic year 2013/14 in order to ensure that all on time applicants received a valid offer. In consultation with the Portfolio Holder it was agreed to open two reception classes at Worsley Bridge School in September 2013 offering 60 places. The effect is this is to bring forward the date on which Worsley Bridge becomes an all through school to September 2013.

On 12 June 2013 a statutory notice was published in the News Shopper (copy attached as Appendix A) setting out the proposal to change the age range from 7-11 to 4-11 from 1 September 2013. This was displayed as required on the school gates, in local libraries and circulated to all interested parties, the same as those consulted at the informal stage, for a six week period ending on 24 July 2013. It was also placed on the Bromley Council website.

A copy of the Statement of Case on the DfE template is also attached at Appendix B.

No objections were received, with one comment in support submitted via the web site.

4. POLICY IMPLICATIONS

The proposal to change the school to an all through is in line with the Council's policy to amalgamate infant and junior schools where the opportunity arises. In this case, as the two schools are on separate sites, it was agreed that each school would become an all through primary to secure its own recruitment from the age of 4 to 11. At present, children from Bromley Road Infants move to Worsley Bridge at the age of 7 under a linked arrangement.

All through status avoids the need for children to change schools at the age of 7 which can be disruptive to learning and cohesion. It will also be easier for parents who at present have children in both schools to manage travelling and collection arrangements, as well as enabling them to build relationships with the school for the whole primary career of their children.

Transitional arrangements are being made for children who will still need to transfer from Bromley Road into year 3 up to September 2016, with priority being given as at present to those who are not able to secure a place in year 3 in Bromley Road. These transitional arrangements are subject to separate approval from the Schools Adjudicator.

5. FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

The school's delegated budget will increase in proportion to the additional numbers on the roll, determine by the formula funding mechanism under the Delegated Schools Grant.

The capital cost for the additional classrooms is subject to the outcome of a feasibility study currently being prepared although outline provision has been made of £400,000 in the Basic Need Capital Programme approved on 19 March 2013.

6. LEGAL IMPLICATIONS

The statutory notice was issued in accordance with the requirements as set out in the relevant legislation above. Section 21 of the Education and Inspections Act 2006 provide for regulation to set out who must decide proposals for any prescribed alterations, and Schedules 3 and 5 of the same Act make detailed provision for these to be approved by the Local Authority.

If the LA fails to decide proposals within two months of the end of the representation period the LA must forward proposals, and any received representations (not withdrawn in writing) to the schools adjudicator for decision.

The LA has the right to determine the decision making process. Appeals may be made against the decision within four weeks, to be decided by the adjudicator.

7. PERSONNEL IMPLICATIONS

This report does give rise to potential staffing implications for September 2013 as the school will need to ensure teaching provision for the two new reception classes. In the event that the proposal to restructure the school is progressed, Worsley Bridge will require support on an individual basis tailored to their specific staffing structure.

Staffing implications may arise as the school develops. Dependent on pupil numbers, the number of teaching Full-Time Equivalent (FTE) staff required to facilitate the curriculum and support the infrastructure may increase or decrease which could give rise to a potential redundancy situation. In this event detailed consultation with staff and Trade Union representatives would be undertaken with a view to mitigating the impact of any potential redundancy. Further considerations may include the grading for the Head Teachers as the Individual School Range may be affected.

Notice is given in accordance with section 19(1) of the Education and Inspections Act 2006 that London Borough of Bromley intends to make a prescribed alteration to Worsley Bridge Community Junior School Brackley Road Beckenham Kent BR3 1RF from 01 September 2013. The effect of this proposal is to make Worsley Bridge Junior School into an all through primary school by changing the age range from 7-11 to 4-11.

The current capacity of the school is 359 and the proposed capacity will be 420. The current admission number for the school is 90 and the proposed admission number will be 60.

Bromley BR1 3UH

- 1 This proposal is linked to a parallel notice for the change in age range of Bromley Road Community Infant School to take effect in September 2014. Under these proposals both schools become all though primaries.
- 2 Specific admissions arrangements are being put in place to provide for the transition period, and these are the subject of separate consultation with the Schools Adjudicator.
- Although the original consultation was on the basis that implementation for both schools would be in September 2014, it is proposed to make the change at Worsley Bridge in September 2013 to provide additional reception class places to meet local demand.
- 4 Provision has been made in the Council's capital budget to enlarge the school to meet the increased numbers.
- 5 The school would be known as Worsley Bridge Community Primary School. Civic Centre, Stockwell Close.
