3. COMMENTARY

- 3.1 The Chairman has been approached by Sir Robin Wales, directly elected Mayor of LB Newham, who is trying to enlist support for a submission under the Sustainable Communities Act 2007 concerning the proliferation of high stakes Fixed Odds Betting Terminals (FOBTs) in betting outlets, which in turn can lead to clustering of betting shops, which have a cap of four machines per shop. The proposal is explained in the attached letter (<u>Appendix 1</u>), but the key point is to reduce the maximum stake available on these machines from £100 to £2, bringing them into line with other gaming machines.
- 3.2 The views of the Committee are sought on whether the Council should express support for Newham's campaign.

4. LEGAL IMPLICATIONS

4.1 The Sustainable Communities Act 2007 provides an opportunity for local communities and councils to ask central government remove legislative or other barriers that prevent them from improving the economic, social and environmental well-being of their areas. The Government has a duty to try to reach agreement with Councils within a year of a submission being made. For submissions to be successful they usually need to have broad support from local authorities.
