Addressing inequalities in COVID-19 Vaccination uptake

Ethnicity – uptake is lower in Black Caribbean (64.1%) and Black African (67.6%) groups

Deprivation – uptake is lower in the more deprived areas of the Borough (Penge & Anerley, The Crays, Mottingham)

People with Serious Mental Illness – uptake is 72.2%

Care Home Staff – uptake is 71.3%

Muslim doctors encourage residents to get their vaccine

The NHS in south east London is working with GPs, volunteers, and faith leaders at the Al-Emaan Mosque in Keston to offer the COVID-19 vaccine to people of all faiths and none.

The Al-Emaan Mosque was one of the first mosques in the country to open its doors to vaccinees. Dr Oussama, Senior GP of the mosque and the Imam, has been instrumental in offering the vaccine to people who are high risk, please do get yourselves vaccinated. Vaccines have received the strictest safety and efficacy checks. Please do contact your GP or call 020 8175 0473 for more information.

There has been concern amongst those observing Ramadan that they may not be able to take the COVID-19 vaccine while fasting. Dr Oussama, GP and Imam of the Al-Emaan Mosque, who are covering several of the vaccination centres in Bromley and are working with the Al-Emaan Mosque, said: "Muslims who observe it is acceptable to have the vaccine during Ramadan because of its benefits and the fact that it is in the name of medical science. As it is an immunisation injection that does not provide any nutritional benefit, scholars are clear that the vaccine does not break the fast. It is halal and contains no meat products." Dr Oussama said: "The COVID-19 vaccine does not discriminate against age, gender, race, religion, or background. Each person has a moral duty to protect their own health as well as an ethical duty to protect those around them and a responsibility for the sustainable use of the NHS. We can try and avoid from the area, develop mental immunity with all the risk that that carries, or we can do the right thing and get vaccinated."

There have been 10,000 Muslims and 1,000 people of other faiths who have been vaccinated at the mosque since it opened. They encourage individuals to be vaccinated personally yourself and check in to the mosque to be vaccinated. The mosque has been instrumental in offering the vaccine to people who are high risk, please do get yourselves vaccinated. Vaccines have received the strictest safety and efficacy checks. Please do contact your GP or call 020 8175 0473 for more information.

If you are aged 16 and over, an eligible health condition, you receive a Care Certificate, or you are a care home staff, you should normally be vaccinated. High risk and clinically extremely vulnerable (CEV) - you can book your vaccine at a mass vaccination site or participating primary care or community health centres or call 119 without needing an invitation. Or you can be contacted by your GP services who will offer you a vaccine at one of the GP-led sites available across Bromley.

If you are not eligible for the vaccine yet, still to be contacted. The NHS will let you know when it's your turn to have the vaccine.

In Bromley we have GP-led vaccination hubs, two clinics, and a mass vaccination site at the Bromley Civic Centre offering the vaccine to residents. The GP-led hubs, such as the one at the mosque, are being set up in areas of need to help people get their vaccine as early as possible. Community Response to Winter and Wave 2

As part of the wider Bromley System Plan, One Bromley partners developed the following schemes to support the system strategic priorities of

- Meet additional winter and covid demands on front line services with a focus on supporting and preventing acute pressure
- Focus on supporting vulnerable groups to prevent the need for hospital based care.
- Ensuring sufficient resource to manage Covid 19 wave 2, learning from wave 1.

- **Bromley Community Covid Management Service (BCCMS)**
 - Established in the first wave and continued throughout the second wave
 - Capacity expanded during wave 2, receiving Covid referrals from GPs, 111 and the PRUH
 - Has seen over 5,200 patients
 - At its peak, it was seeing over 60 patients a day with a caseload over 200 patients
- **Oximetry at Home pathway (run through the BCCMS)**
 - Remote monitoring of patients using an oximeters
 - Monitored through an on-line platform, having been assessed and overseen by the BCCMS
 - At its peak, the service had over 190 patients being monitored
- **Bromley Community Respiratory Management Service**
 - Extending the community respiratory Service which will provide additional capacity to provide an extended hours provision to manage acute exacerbation of chronic respiratory conditions.
 - The service included consultant oversight from the PRUH.
 - Also supported the discharge of patients from the PRUH
- **Bromley GP Access Hot Hub In Beckenham**
 - The establishment of an additional GP Access "Hot" Hub In Beckenham with arrangements in place to see patients with Covid-19 symptoms.
 - The service offered face to face appointments in a dedicated hot hub, providing additional capacity GPs through the winter months.
 - Since the start of the service the hub has seen over 700 patients

Post-COVID (Long COVID) Update

What is it?

How long it takes to recover from covid-19 will vary, but most people will make a full recovery within 12 weeks after the onset of symptoms. NICE defines post-COVID syndrome as signs and symptoms that develop during or following an infection consistent with COVID-19 which continue for more than 12 weeks and are not explained by an alternative diagnosis

Symptoms include

- extreme tiredness (fatigue)
- shortness of breath
- chest pain or tightness
- problems with memory and concentration ("brain fog")
- difficulty sleeping (insomnia)
- heart palpitations
- dizziness
- pins and needles
- joint pain
- depression and anxiety
- tinnitus, earaches
- feeling sick, diarrhoea, stomach aches, loss of appetite
- a high temperature, cough, headaches, sore throat, changes to sense of smell or taste
- rashes

Hospital Discharge - Single Point of Access (SPA)



Hospital Discharge from the PRUH in Waves 1 and 2 of the Pandemic

The graph below shows the volumes of supported discharges from the PRUH. It shows that although there was variance from week to week, overall activity has largely remained consistent within the pre Covid19 activity range (between 150-225 from October 2019 – January 2021).

Patients needing Supported Discharge at any stage during admission




1 This peak in activity can be attributed to the surge in discharge activity as the hospital prepared for Wave 1.

2 This dip in activity can be linked to the period when some key staff (DisCos) were redeployed to meet other demands.

3 This dip activity can be related to the higher mortality rate that the hospital experienced during the second Wave.


Single Point of Access (SPA) and Integrated Discharge Pathways

There are two key parts to our discharge arrangements 1. a multi-agency clinical triaging system 2. a wider infrastructure that supports and manages a residents transition back into the community.



Supported Discharge Destinations


The graph below describes all activity that has been triaged through the SPA by outcome pathway for April 2020 – 2021:

Referral pathways by organisation

The graph below details the percentage of activity (not capacity) by pathway for all referrals processed through the SPA from April 2020 – 2021. Of which, 6% relates to onward referrals to the CCG, 27% to LBB and 67% to BCH services. It should be noted that district nursing has seen a sharp increase in referrals due to the pandemic, this level of activity is unlikely to continue post Covid19.
